The Missing Children’s Network is the only charity organization in Quebec that assists parents in the search for their missing child. In addition, we contribute to the reduction of missing children by teaching youth to protect themselves and by educating the public.

- 4** Raise awareness and educate different audiences on personal safety and prevention of missing children.

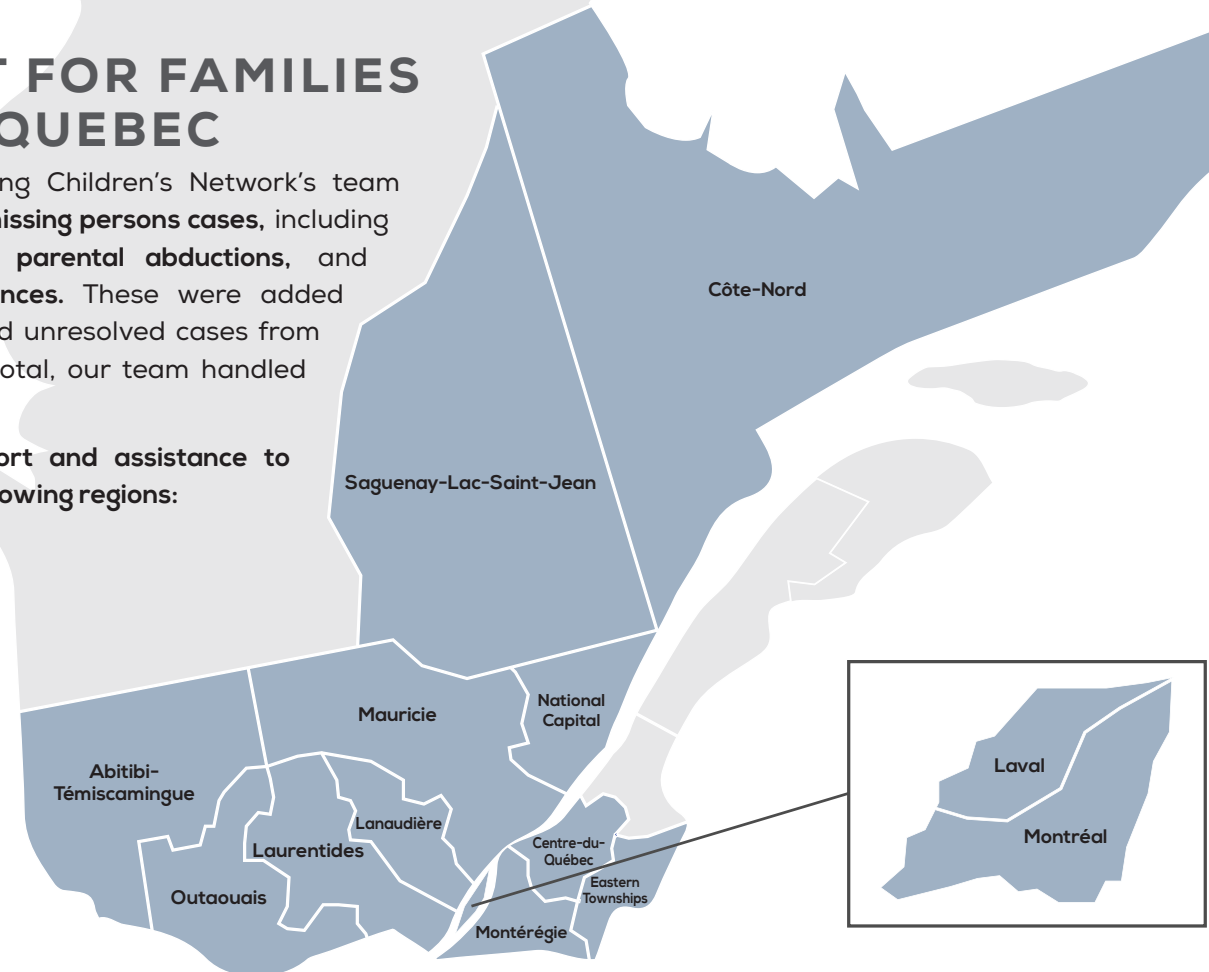
AT THE HEART OF OUR MISSION, BRINGING MISSING CHILDREN HOME

According to statistics published by the RCMP, **6,653 children** were reported missing in 2024. In Quebec, on average, **18 youth** are reported missing daily (Missing Children's Network). Not only is the disappearance of children a nightmare for parents, but it is also a tragedy for the entire province.

SUPPORT FOR FAMILIES ACROSS QUEBEC

In 2024, the Missing Children's Network's team recorded **167 new missing persons cases**, including **135 runaways**, **27 parental abductions**, and **5 adult disappearances**. These were added to the **94 active** and unresolved cases from previous years. In total, our team handled **261 cases**.

This collaboration contributed to solving **151 disappearance cases**.

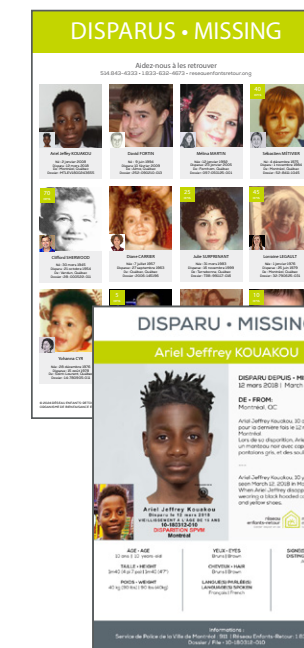

OUR ACTIONS IN 2024, OUR SEARCH TEAM:

- Handled **75 assistance cases** for intervention or prevention outside of our registered missing persons cases. These assistance calls cover a wide range of topics, including parental abduction prevention, runaway prevention, and general safety concerns.

- Organized the **2nd edition** of our conference titled "Best Practices: Working Together in Cases of Missing Children." This critically important event brought together key players involved in cases of missing children. We welcomed **75 participants** from various law enforcement agencies across Quebec.



- Produced a new annual poster featuring **12 unresolved cases** of missing children.
- Commemorated Missing Children's Day on **May 25** by hosting a beautiful gathering in a park for the families we support and the community.

- Marked the anniversaries of disappearance for **31 unresolved cases**.
- Publicly unveiled an age-progression photo created by experts from the Sûreté du Québec to mark the **6th anniversary** of Ariel Jeffrey Kouakou's disappearance. This image was shared across media outlets and social media platforms.

- Launched a public awareness campaign during Runaway Prevention Month to educate the public about the dangers of running away. We provided several free resources, including our practical Runaway Prevention Guide for parents and professionals, as well as a series of blog articles.

- Collaborated with the Sûreté du Québec during the activation of **6 AMBER Alerts** (involving 8 children), all of whom were safely recovered.

COLLABORATION AND NETWORKING

On February 14, our Director of Operations participated in the Commemorative March and National Day of Action in Montreal for Missing and Murdered Indigenous Women, Girls, Trans, and Two-Spirit People. The event aimed to honour and raise awareness of the countless disappearances, murders, and violence against First Nations and Inuit peoples over the years.

On May 16, during Victims and Survivors of Crime Week, our Director of Operations was invited by AFPAD to present the Missing Children's Network to its clients, partners, and subscribers.

On May 25, we marked Missing Children's Day by organizing a gathering at Parc de Normandville, featuring games, an information booth, and fun activities for the general public and the families we support.



We contributed to the development and launch of AFPAD's 7th information and support guide, "The Disappearance of a Loved One." The guide addresses the many impacts of a loved one's disappearance on their family and community. It aims to support, inform, and raise awareness by providing concrete information on the procedures to follow in the event of a disappearance and the effects of stress in such cases.

We had the privilege of meeting the new Executive Director of CAVAC Montreal, with whom we exchanged information about our respective services. This meeting strengthened our partnership and commitment to working together effectively.

Our intervention team led a training session titled "Best Practices in Parental Abduction and Child Disappearance Cases" for Early Childhood Education students at LaSalle College.

We proudly continued our partnership with the "Our Missing Children" program, along with our collaboration with the Litigation Section of Global Affairs Canada. We also maintained our working relationships with: The Royal Canadian Mounted Police (RCMP), the Canada Border Services Agency (CBSA), the Central Authority of the Quebec Ministry of Justice, the Batshaw Youth and Family Centres, as well as with the coordination agents within various police departments across Quebec.

We have strengthened and developed privileged relationships with several shelters for women in distress and other community organizations, social workers working in Youth Centres, and family law specialists in Quebec.

We have shared information and collaborated with the Canadian Centre for Child Protection in cases where we believe the child is hiding or being detained in another province.

THE MEDIA: INDISPENSABLE ALLIES

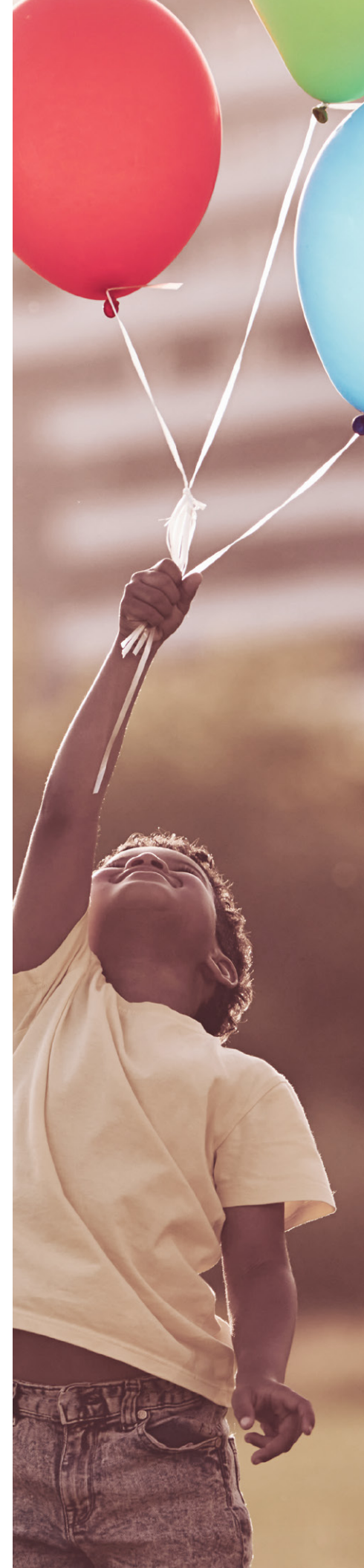
As every year, the media have been numerous in seeking the expertise of the Missing Children's Network. Whether in traditional and print media or on specialized platforms, many interviews were granted in 2024 on various subjects, notably runaways, parental abduction, exploitation of minors, and child safety.

Moreover, during the National Missing Children's Day, we collaborated with Global Montreal, a long-standing partner. This partnership allowed not only to increase awareness among Quebecers about the issue of missing children but also to inform parents and educators on how to better protect children from abduction, assault, and exploitation.

KEEPING HOPE ALIVE: OUR VISIBILITY PARTNERS

Broadcasting the photo of a missing child can be crucial in ensuring a prompt return rather than a prolonged search. Data shows that one in five children is found by citizens who have identified them on a poster. The Missing Children's Network is grateful to be able to collaborate with numerous businesses, government agencies, transportation companies, community organizations, and volunteers who help distribute our posters and missing person notices widely across Quebec. Their invaluable support significantly enhances our effectiveness in locating missing children. This year, thanks to these valuable partnerships, our posters were widely distributed:

- **Total Logistics**, which displays our missing child notices on its trucks travelling across Quebec.
- **The Canada Border Services Agency (CBSA)**, which posts our annual posters at Montreal's Pierre-Elliott-Trudeau International Airport.
- **The Montreal Alouettes**, who showcased three missing child posters on the Jumbotron at every home game.
- **Our online community**, which actively shares missing child notices on the Missing Children's Network social media, ensuring rapid and widespread dissemination.
- **Schools, media outlets, and the general public**

OUR WORKSHOPS FOR YOUTH

Missing Children's Network is well-positioned to develop solutions tailored to youth, while ensuring their safety. We offer **educational and prevention resources** for youth, families, and professionals who support them. These tools aim to **raise awareness of safe behaviours** in various situations, such as commuting to and from school, managing unsupervised time at home, handling emergencies, and preventing the risks of abduction and sexual exploitation.

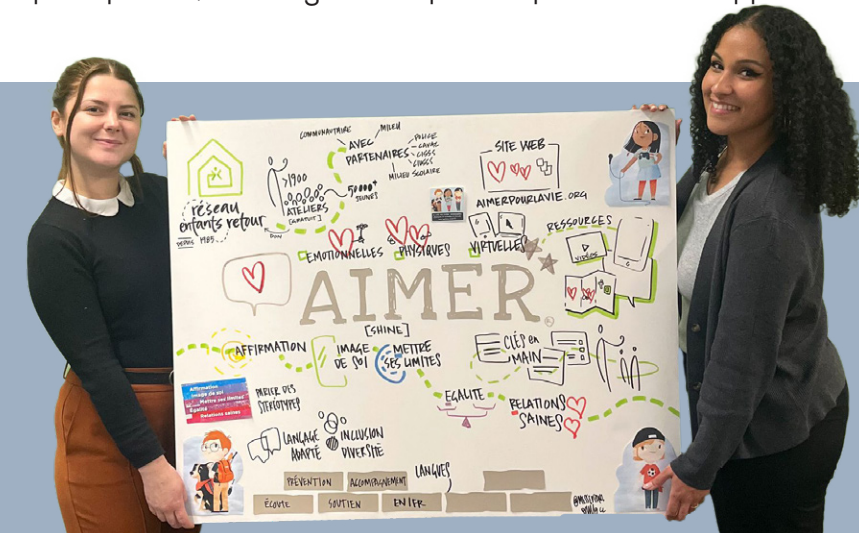

OUR PREVENTION TEAM

At the Heart of Our Actions, we find our Prevention Team, made up of two passionate and dedicated Youth Workers. Sandra and Chloé, each bringing their unique expertise, work together to provide personalized support to youth and their families.

THEIR MISSION: To raise awareness, educate, and prevent. Every day, they lead interactive workshops, develop prevention strategies, and build strong relationships with schools and communities. They are fully committed to ensuring the safety and well-being of youth by equipping them with the tools they need to navigate an increasingly complex environment.



Together, they are committed to delivering high-quality, evolving interventions to address current and future challenges related to youth safety.

Sandra: Sandra is a trained nurse who brings her professional experience working with youth. She leads French-language workshops.

Chloé: Chloé holds a degree in sociology and applies her empathy and compassion when facilitating workshops in both English and French.

TAILORED WORKSHOPS TO MEET SPECIFIC NEEDS

In 2024, our prevention team expanded its reach to address the specific needs of youth outside the school environment. Recognizing that safety and prevention are broad-reaching issues, our team collaborated with community organizations and youth support services, such as **Go Jeunesse** and **Batshaw Youth and Family Centres**. These partnerships allowed us to extend our mission beyond schools, reaching youth from diverse backgrounds, including those who may be more vulnerable or have specialized needs. These organizations support youth facing complex realities, requiring a tailored, respectful, and proactive approach. Through these collaborations, we were able to implement targeted interventions designed specifically for these groups.

Our specialists also facilitate workshops in classes for newcomers, communication and learning support classes, and in fully adapted schools, such as **LINKS High School**, which serves students with special needs. Our goal is to continue these efforts in 2025, expanding our partnerships and further adapting our resources to meet the needs of this diverse population.

DAY CAMPS: SUMMER AWARENESS

During the summer, our prevention team continued its essential mission by visiting day camps to lead fun and interactive workshops. The goal? To raise awareness among youth—and their counsellors—in an engaging and enjoyable way.

Our Team:

- Reached **964 youth** across **8 day camps**
- Delivered **3 awareness sessions** for **76 professionals** at: Centre d'Appui aux Communautés Immigrantes (CACI), Les Fourchettes de l'espoir day camp

We are proud to have been able to offer informative seminars and provide valuable tools to strengthen skills and create safe and caring environments for youth, with the support and active engagement of the adults around them.

For the children, the playful and participatory approach made it easier to address important topics, such as: identifying trusted adults, adopting safe behaviours, and looking out for one another. Even during the height of day camp fun, these young participants learned how to develop habits that promote their safety and well-being.

It was a wonderful summer filled with learning, respect, and safety for all!

UPDATING OUR SKILLS TO ADDRESS TOMORROW'S CHALLENGES

Throughout the year, our team participates in various training sessions and webinars. This initiative aims to keep our expertise constantly updated, ensuring we can better meet the needs of youth while expanding our partnership network. These training sessions allow us to acquire new skills, whether technical or cross-functional, to stay current in an ever-evolving professional environment.

In 2024, our prevention team was able to participate in the following training sessions:

- **"Identifying Individuals Vulnerable to Suicide"** – Certified by the Association québécoise de prévention du suicide (AQPS), delivered by experts from the Centre de Prévention du Suicide de Montréal (CPSM)
- **Sexual Exploitation Training** – CIUSSS de la Capitale-Nationale
- **Community of Practice, training in Prevention and Intervention: Sexual Exploitation of Youth** – CIUSSS de la Capitale-Nationale

OUR SEMINARS FOR PARENTS AND PROFESSIONALS

Our seminars provide accurate and up-to-date information on the challenges faced by parents and professionals. They help develop practical skills to address youth safety, including sensitive topics.

In 2024, our Prevention Team also:

- Informed **73 parents** about runaway prevention and sexual exploitation, including workshops at Défi-Illes et des ailes, in partnership with SPVM community social workers.
- Hosted **6 information and awareness booths**, reaching approximately 100 people at various events, including: National Missing Children's Day, The National Assembly, Anjou College Info Fair, Operation Backpack, Parc Extension Neighbourhood Party, and Marmaille et Famille Fair

We adapt to different audiences and contexts, which allows us to effectively meet the unique needs of each group. This flexibility ensures we can address sensitive topics in an accessible and impactful way.

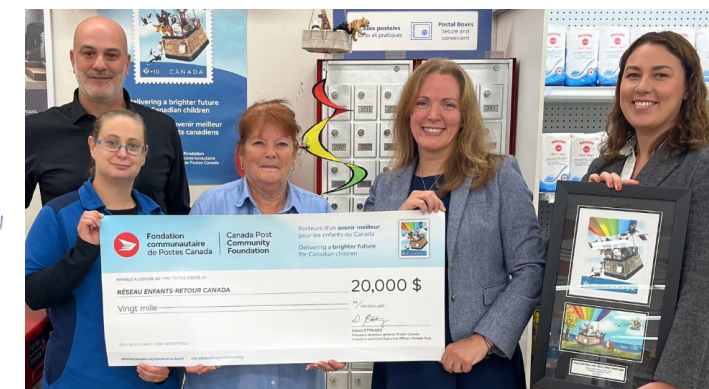

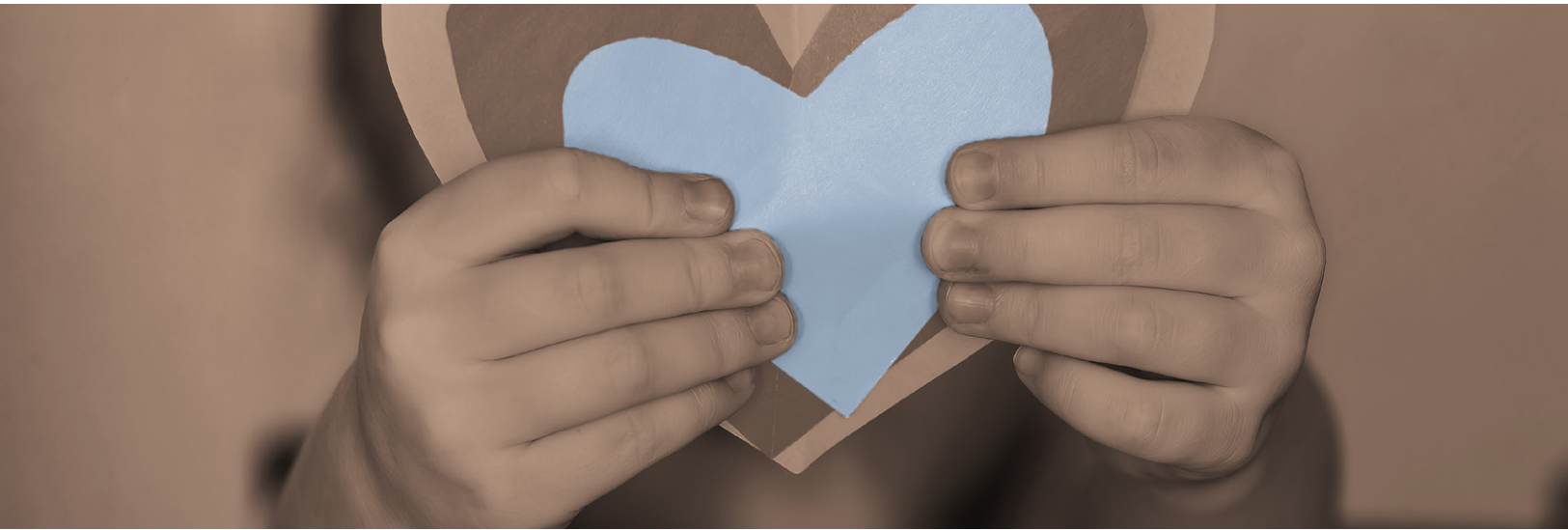
