generosity, over \$1 million was raised. We extend our warmest thanks for sharing this unique moment with us.

This year also marked the arrival of new, passionate members to our team. Their energy, creativity, and expertise allow us to expand our reach and provide even stronger support to families throughout Quebec.

The Missing Children's Network (MCN) is the only recognized charity organization in Quebec that assists parents in the search for their missing child. In addition, we contribute to the reduction of missing children by teaching youth to protect themselves and by educating the general public.

- 4 Raise awareness and educate different audiences on personal safety and prevention of missing children.

OUR IMPACT

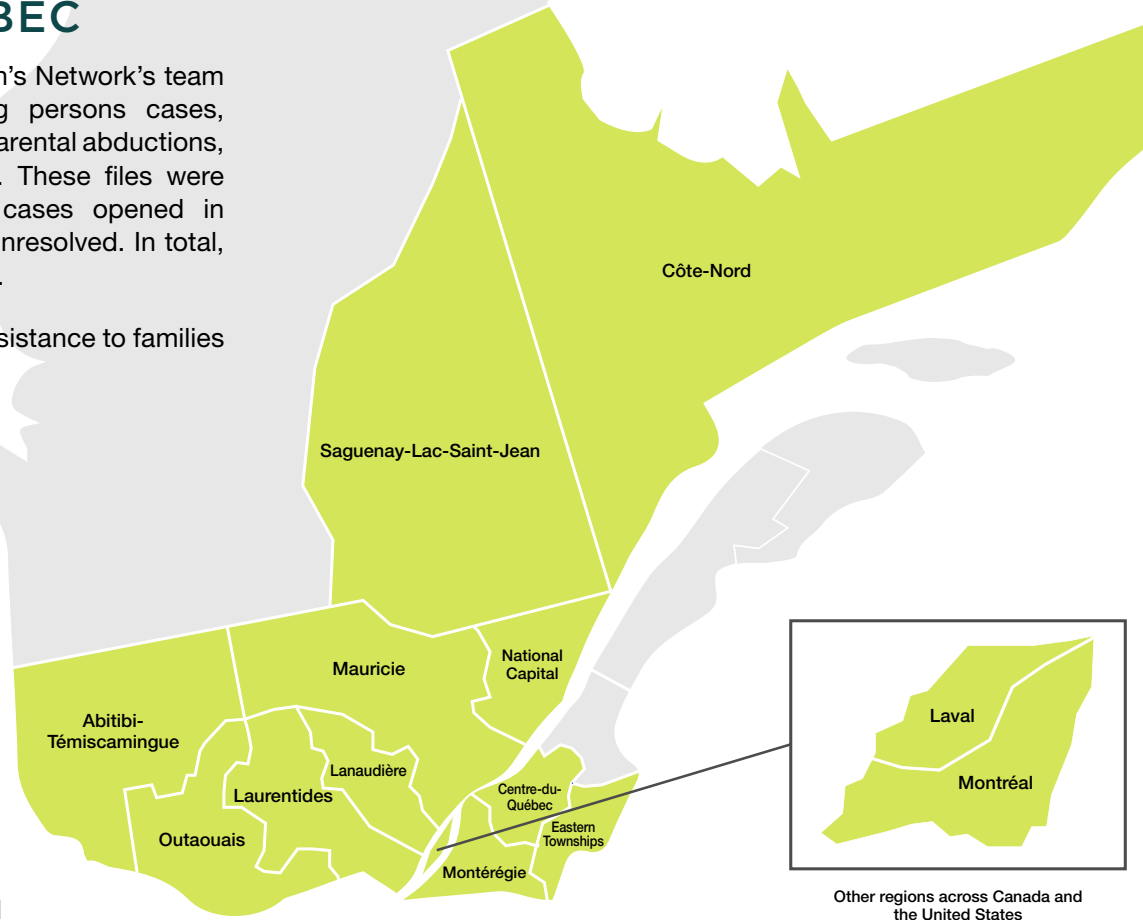
SUPPORT AND INTERVENTION: ENSURING EVERY CHILD RETURNS HOME

According to statistics published by the Royal Canadian Mounted Police (RCMP), 7,398 children were reported missing in Quebec in 2025, representing an average of 20 youth reported missing each day. Beyond the nightmare experienced by parents and loved ones, the disappearance of a child constitutes a collective ordeal that shakes Quebec society as a whole.

SUPPORTING FAMILIES ACROSS QUEBEC

In 2025, the Missing Children’s Network’s team recorded 127 new missing persons cases, including 109 runaways, 17 parental abductions, and 1 adult disappearance. These files were added to the 107 active cases opened in previous years that remain unresolved. In total, our team handled 236 cases.

This collaboration contributed to solving 102 disappearance cases.

OUR INTERVENTION ACTIVITIES

In 2025, the MCN continued its efforts to support families, raise awareness, and collaborate with police and community partners to prevent child disappearances and respond quickly when they occur. Among our main actions:

- Our intervention team handled **68 assistance cases in addition to active disappearance files**, covering topics such as parental abduction prevention, runaway prevention, and general safety.
- A press conference was held at Parc des Bateliers in Montreal, in collaboration with the SPVM and other partners, to unveil a **new poster of Ariel Kouakou, missing since 2018**, with the goal of reviving public awareness and supporting efforts to locate him.



- We hosted the 3rd edition of the conference **Best Practices: Working Together in Cases of Missing Children**, which brought together 82 police officers and key stakeholders involved in missing child cases in Quebec.
- **International Missing Children’s Day**, on May 25, was marked at Parc Nicolas-Tillemont in Montreal. The event allowed parents, loved ones, and children to better understand disappearances and leave with practical prevention tools.



OUR IMPACT

- We commemorated the disappearance anniversaries of **24 unresolved cases**.
- As part of **Runaway Prevention Month**, an **awareness campaign** was launched to inform the public about the risks associated with running away. Several free resources were shared, including a practical guide for parents and professionals, as well as a series of blog articles.



- Thanks to the commitment of volunteers, **we updated the directory for victims of sexual exploitation**, as well as the distribution list for the annual poster featuring 12 children still missing in Quebec. Special thanks to Martin Desjardins, real estate broker, for his support.
- Two interns from the Social Work Techniques program at Cégep du Vieux Montréal and the Social Service program at Dawson College helped us in **supporting families and handling disappearance case files**.
- Finally, **23 volunteers** supported the intervention team with various administrative tasks and contributed to the mission during different events.

ANNUAL POSTER AND DISAPPEARANCE ANNIVERSARIES

Each year, the MCN unveils a new annual poster to remind the public that some children are still missing. This initiative highlights 12 cases in order to revive collective memory, with the hope of advancing investigations and supporting families and their loved ones.

In 2025, several significant disappearance anniversaries were marked:

- **James Khan** – Case resolved. The entire team extends its deepest condolences to the family and loved ones.
- **Sylvie Ouimet** – missing for 50 years
- **Renée Larose** – missing for 50 years
- **Isabelle Bourgeot** – missing for 40 years
- **Mélina Martin** – missing for 20 years

These anniversaries are deeply emotional moments. They remind us of the importance of never forgetting and continuing efforts to obtain answers.

Each name on this poster represents far more than a case: it represents a family waiting, and a collective commitment to continue the search.



PARTICIPATION IN WEBINARS AND TRAINING SESSIONS

Throughout the year, our intervention team participated in several webinars and training activities to maintain up-to-date knowledge and deepen expertise:

- **Indigenous Homelessness** – Women’s Centre of Montreal
Training on the realities and challenges faced by Indigenous people experiencing homelessness, including barriers to social services and adapted approaches for better support.
- **Giving Survivors a Voice: The Art of Testifying to Exit Prostitution** – Espaces V.I.E.
Workshop aimed at understanding the testimonial process of survivors, developing active listening skills, and adopting respectful methods to support individuals who have experienced sexual exploitation.
- **Runaways and Associated Issues (Runaway Day 2.0)** – Sphères Coordination & Youth Program Directorate
Seminar on the causes and consequences of running away among youth, warning signs, and prevention and intervention strategies adapted to different situations.
- **Artificial Intelligence: Efficiency or Risk** – Info-Crime
Presentation on the impact of artificial intelligence in the field of security, including its applications in crime prevention and risks related to privacy and data protection.
- **Family Violence: Safety of Victims and Children** – Barreau du Québec
Training on legal and safety practices to protect victims of family violence, with a focus on child protection and coordination with social and police services.

These activities strengthened our practices and enhanced our ability to support families and youth affected by disappearance or exploitation.

OUR IMPACT

COLLABORATION AND NETWORKING

Over the past year, we strengthened our partnerships with numerous key stakeholders, which are essential to ensuring a rapid and coordinated response to missing child cases and to supporting their families.

- **Training and awareness:** We delivered online presentations to 39 Canada Border Services Agency officers at Montréal-Trudeau Airport to present our services and enhance collaboration in preventing parental abductions and during reunifications.
- **Community engagement:** Our Director of Operations and interns participated in the Every Child Matters walk on September 30, 2025, in support of truth and reconciliation with Indigenous communities.
- **GBA+ certification program:** In partnership with White Ribbon and other organizations, we contributed to the development of a certification program aimed at equipping participants to apply Gender-Based Analysis Plus (GBA+) in their interventions.
- **Knowledge sharing:** Our intervention team met virtually with the management of the Crime Victims Assistance Centre (CAVAC) Montréal and frontline workers in sexual exploitation to present our services, better understand respective mandates, and define referral processes for cases involving runaway youth who are victims of exploitation.
- **Collaboration with various partners:** Throughout the year, we worked with several organizations and institutions, including youth protection services, Structure Fugues, Sexto, Toxic-Alert, the RCMP, Global Affairs Canada, Aire ouverte, the Native Women's Shelter of Montreal, AFPAD, and the CIUSSS Centre-Sud-de-l'Île-de-Montréal.
- **Strategic partnerships:** We continued our collaborations with the Our Missing Children program, the litigation section of Global Affairs Canada, the RCMP, the Canada Border Services Agency, the Central Authority of the Quebec Department of Justice, Batshaw Youth and Family Centres, and police coordination officers across Quebec.
- **Expanded network and interprovincial collaboration:** We strengthened ties with shelters, community organizations, social workers, and family law lawyers. We also exchanged information with the Canadian Centre for Child Protection in cases involving children located in other provinces.

A VOICE FOR MISSING CHILDREN

THE MEDIA: ESSENTIAL ALLIES

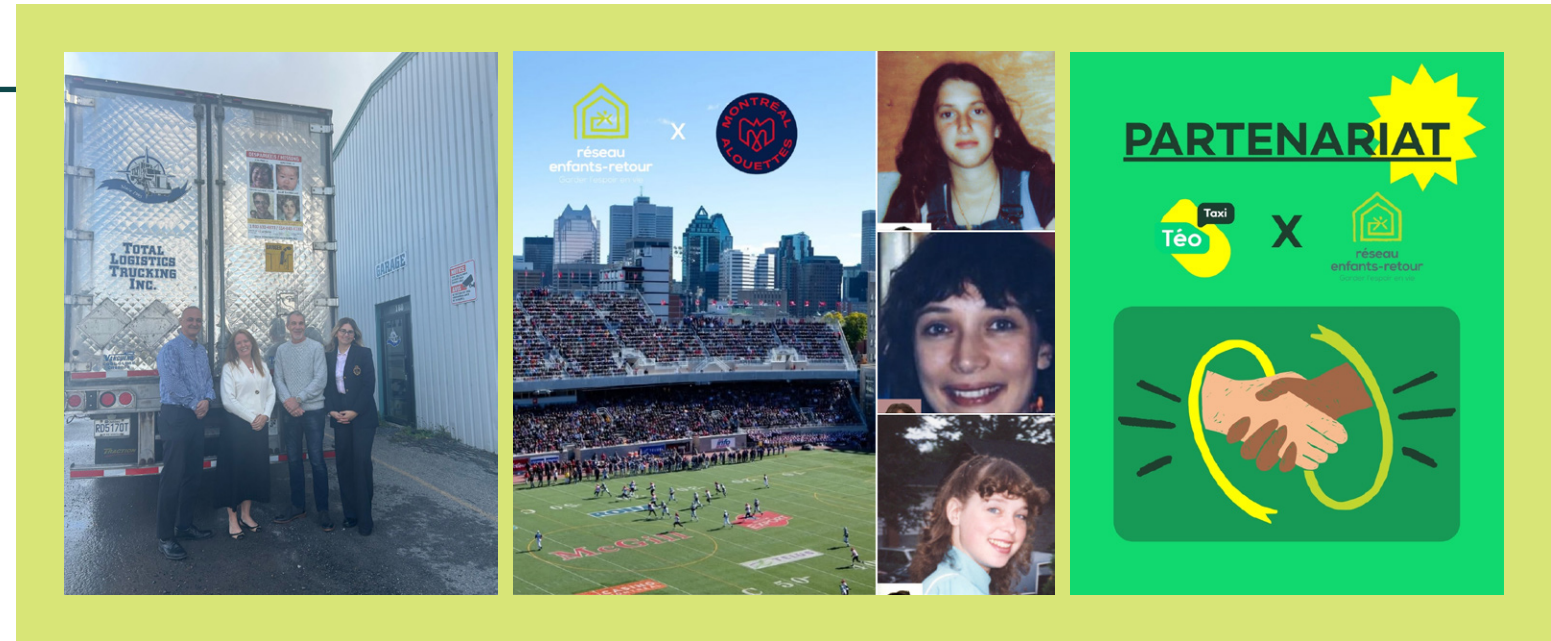
In 2025, the media were key partners in sharing accurate and responsible information about missing children. Through their collaboration, the MCN raised public awareness, supported families, and kept the memory of children still missing alive.

Our team gave numerous interviews on various issues, including parental abductions, runaways, youth sexual exploitation, best practices in disappearance cases, and prevention. Each appearance helped reinforce proper responses, give a voice to families, counter misinformation, and promote respectful approaches toward affected children.

We collaborated with several media outlets, including the **Journal de Montréal, Radio-Canada, TVA Nouvelles, Noovo Info, CBC News, and The Gazette.** These interventions helped bring renewed attention to unresolved cases, ensured media coverage during sensitive moments, and highlighted the Network's 40 years of commitment.

On International Missing Children's Day, we partnered with **Global Montréal** to raise awareness and inform parents and educators about ways to protect children from abduction, abuse, and exploitation.

KEEPING HOPE ALIVE: OUR VISIBILITY PARTNERS

Sharing the photo of a missing child can make all the difference between a safe return and a prolonged disappearance. According to U.S. reports, including those from the National Center for Missing & Exploited Children, one in five children is found thanks to a citizen who recognized them from a poster.

The MCN is deeply grateful to collaborate with a wide range of partners: businesses, government agencies, community organizations, schools, media, volunteers, and members of our community. Thanks to this collaboration, our posters and missing child alerts are widely distributed across Quebec, strengthening our ability to locate missing children and support their families.

Our display partners include:

OUR IMPACT

PREVENTION: EMPOWERING OUR YOUTH TO STAY SAFE OUR WORKSHOPS FOR YOUTH

Through its expertise, the MCN develops practical approaches tailored to the needs of youth and strengthens their safety through prevention workshops. We provide educational and awareness resources for youth, their families, and those who support them. These tools help youth or students adopt safe behaviours in everyday situations—whether alone, online, or in emergencies. The MCN’s mission is to reduce the risks of abduction and exploitation while promoting a safe environment for all youth.

Our facilitators continuously monitor emerging youth behaviours and trends to keep workshop content relevant and adapted to both online and offline realities. This approach allows us to adapt our resources and interventions to remain relevant to current realities, both online and offline and to effectively address the challenges youth and their families may face.



OUR PREVENTION INITIATIVES

Each week, our facilitators deliver interactive workshops across Quebec to raise awareness among youth and provide them with practical tools to prevent disappearances. They learn, in particular, to strengthen their self-esteem, set boundaries, build healthy relationships, and adopt safe and responsible behaviours, both online and in their daily lives. By fostering respectful discussions, these workshops also support the development of their autonomy, critical thinking, and positive citizenship.

Our facilitators create safe environments where youth can learn, ask questions, and feel secure. By collaborating with schools and communities, they build a strong network that supports today’s youth and future generations.

Their commitment: to prepare youth for risks, strengthen their vigilance, and provide them with the tools to act safely.

TAILORED WORKSHOPS TO MEET SPECIFIC NEEDS

In 2025, our prevention team strengthened the MCN’s impact by collaborating with community organizations, youth centres, and specialized centres supporting youth, including *Toujours ensemble*, *Go Jeunesse*, and *Batshaw Youth and Family Centres*. These partnerships made it possible to expand our mission beyond the school environment by reaching youth from diverse backgrounds, often more vulnerable or with specific needs.

Partner organizations support youth facing complex realities, which requires an adapted, respectful, safe, and proactive approach to fully support their development and safety.

Our specialists also facilitate workshops in welcome classes for newcomers, communication and learning support classes, and in fully adapted schools which serve students with special needs. Our goal is to continue these efforts in 2026, expanding our partnerships and further adapting our resources to meet the needs of everyone.

OUR IMPACT

DAY CAMPS: SUMMER AWARENESS

This summer, our prevention team delivered interactive and engaging workshops in day camps. Youth and their counsellors explored real-life situations, asked questions, and learned safe ways to act in everyday situations, all in a participatory and welcoming environment.

Our Team:

- Trained 111 professionals across 7 sessions;
- Reached 435 youth in 5 day camps.

The MCN is proud to have provided tools and training to strengthen the safety and well-being of children or youth, while allowing them to learn in a fun and engaging way.

OUR SEMINARS FOR PARENTS AND PROFESSIONALS

Our seminars provide accurate and up-to-date information on the challenges faced by parents and professionals. They help develop practical skills to address youth safety, including sensitive topics.

THE SEASON OF MIRACLES



The holiday season can be particularly difficult for families living with the absence of a child.
